BACKGROUND:

The Petroleum, Natural Gas and Minerals Center of Excellence and Expertise (CEE) initiated operations in September 2012, handling post-release functions for those importers who voluntarily applied to participate in the CEE via the Federal Register Notice (FRN) test process.

On January 20, 2015, CSMS issuance <u>#15-000040</u> advised the trade community that three CEEs (Petroleum, Natural Gas and Minerals; Electronics; and the Pharmaceuticals, Health & Chemicals CEEs) would further expand operations and assume trade authority for post-release trade processes for their respective industry tariff lines for certain Ports of Entry. To date, the Petroleum CEE has expanded operations to all Service Ports in the Seattle, El Paso, Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Diego, Tucson, Chicago, Detroit, Houston and Laredo Field Offices.

CURRENT STATUS:

On June 29, 2015, the Petroleum CEE will initiate its final phase of expansion, assuming trade authority for **post-release documentation** involving HTSUS Chapters 26 and 27 and HTSUS Heading 3826 filed at the *Area/Service Ports* listed on the table below. Upon completion of this phase of expansion, the Petroleum CEE will handle nationwide post-release workload for HTSUS Chapters 26, 27 and HTSUS Heading 3826. The team numbers listed on this table designates the entry summaries and corresponding post-release work that will be processed by Petroleum CEE employees.

Entry summary filing procedures and document submission processes will remain the same for brokers and importers. CBP will consolidate post-release processing to provide an increased level of uniformity and certainty.

An appropriate level of trade staff at these Service Port locations will be transitioned to the CEE to support Center operations. The Center Director will have full authority for trade decisions for the respective industry tariff lines.
